#### Of Interest

SW Farm to Yarn, a member owned collective in Cortez, CO, can special order yarns from Yarn Barn for you. If you need specialty yarns, cotton, linen or other yarns for weaving that are not commonly sold at your LYS check out F2Y. The shop has sample cards from Yarn Barn. A minimum order of \$325 qualifies F2Y for a discount, so the shop will maintain an ongoing special order list, and when that amount is reached will place the order. A discount of 10% (5% for perle cotton) will be passed on to you.

# Tips, Techniques, Educational Soundbites:

Not all of us are dyers but I bet many of us buy hand-dyed yarns for weaving, knitting or spinning. An article in the Summer 2018 issue of Spin Off magazine explained the effects of pH in water and wash fastness in hand-dyed yarns. The article, which has a lot of science in it and uses words like isoelectric. focuses on weak acid dyes, the types used to dye protein fibers. Depending where you live your water may have a higher (basic or alkaline), or weaker (more acidic) pH level. Dyes bond to wool (protein) yarns & fibers at a lower pH. The higher the pH of the water, the more repulsive the dye molecules are to the yarn, and more likely they are to "unbind". Although water used in the dye process will be acidic, thus binding the dye molecules to the yarn, subsequent wash water may be neutral or alkaline, enabling the dye molecules to unbind or wash away. Over time your hand-dyed items will eventually fade. Adding some white vinegar to the wash water will help increase the wash fastness of your precious woolen handmade items.


